First Lesson

My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?

Second Lesson

Mark 15:16-39

Then the soldiers led him into the courtyard of the palace (that is, the governor's headquarters); and they called together the whole cohort. And they clothed him in a purple cloak; and after twisting some thorns into a crown, they put it on him. And they began saluting him, "Hail, King of the Jews!" They struck his head with a reed, spat upon him, and knelt down in homage to him. After mocking him, they stripped him of the purple cloak and put his own clothes on him. Then they led him out to crucify him.

They compelled a passer-by, who was coming in from the country, to carry his cross; it was Simon of Cyrene, the father of Alexander and Rufus. Then they brought Jesus to the place called Golgotha (which means the place of a skull). And they offered him wine mixed with myrrh; but he did not take it. And they crucified him, and divided his clothes among them, casting lots to decide what each should take.

It was nine o'clock in the morning when they crucified him. The inscription of the charge against him read, "The King of the Jews." And with him they crucified two bandits, one on his right and one on his left. Those who passed by derided him, shaking their heads and saying, "Aha! You who would destroy the temple and build it in three days, save yourself, and come down from the cross!" In the same way the chief priests, along with the scribes, were also mocking him among themselves and saying, "He saved others; he cannot save himself. Let the Messiah, the King of Israel, come down from the cross now, so that we may see and believe." Those who were crucified with him also taunted him.

When it was noon, darkness came over the whole land until three in the afternoon. At three o'clock Jesus cried out with a loud voice, "Eloi, Eloi, lema sabachthani?" which means, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" When some of the bystanders heard it, they said, "Listen, he is calling for Elijah." And someone ran, filled a sponge with sour wine, put it on a stick, and gave it to him to drink, saying, "Wait, let us see whether Elijah will come to take him down." Then Jesus gave a loud cry and breathed his last. And the curtain of the temple was torn in two, from top to bottom. Now when the centurion, who stood facing him, saw that in this way he breathed his last, he said, "Truly this man was God's Son!"

Sermon

When Jesus bears the sins of the world, he bears the evils we have been unwilling to admit committing. The Christ bears mockery and shame, insult and abandonment. The Christ experiences the depths of human suffering. The Savior of the world is viewed as less than human, Whipped, spit upon, mocked, degraded, put on display as a message to the world.

When Jesus breathes his last, he exhales the life the God breathed into creation. And as that breath leaves his body, the world testifies to the loss of his life. Darkness comes over the land.

The curtain in the temple is torn in two.

And the centurion who guards Christ the criminal says,

"Truly this man was God's Son."

When Jesus says, "It is finished," he declares that God's love will never end. On the cross, Jesus is put on display as a message to the world. The message we take from that day is that "Truly this man was God's Son," and that the love of God cannot be stopped by sin and evil, by our fear, our failings, our activity, or our inactivity.

On this day, God is God in a way never seen before,

And seen every year since,

in a way that cannot be denied,

as our Creator breathes life into creation in the beginning, our Savior breathes life into us in his end.

It is finished.

It is finished, and we are not.

To God alone be the glory. Amen.

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
JESUS CHRIST: PASSION AND DEATH
